COMMITTEE REPORTS



PRESIDENT REPORT

After a few years of having to alter the way we operate, it seems we finally got back to some normality, and we delivered a successful season. The record number of people returning to our beaches and the diverse nature of the crowds placed extra demands on our members across the Branch at all levels. As usual our Club Patrols and Support Operations dealt with many situations with competence and enthusiasm. There were several tricky rescues and call outs that had to be carefully managed. I applaud all patrolling members, RWC Operators and our Duty Officers. The hours that some individuals have provided are astounding and your dedication does



not go unnoticed. Our eight Clubs have once again shown their commitment to keeping our beaches safe with no lives lost during the past twelve months.

We were fortunate to receive a new 4WD Support Operations vehicle and we purchased a new RWC during the season which assists with our coverage across the Branch. Ongoing RWC, UAV and Duty Officer Training took place along with the rollout of Search and Rescue Kits to all Clubs. There has been a considerable amount of money spent in this area however we are highly regarded amongst the Emergency Services Agencies and development in this arena is vital for our sustainability as an organisation, allowing us to expand our capability and cover our coastline more efficiently.

In keeping with our sustainability is the need to foster our Juniors and the recruitment and retention of our youth. Thanks to Gary Hawkins and his team who have once again provided support for our initiatives. A successful Dee Why Development Camp in January once again allowed our cadets to see the opportunities and pathways that are available through Surf Life Saving. The Junior Life Saver of the Year saw Jack McGrath and Gabby Turner awarded the title for the 2022/23 season. Thank you to the Junior Lifesaver of the Year Panel and Newcastle Permanent for your support. The Raising of the Flags Ceremony was held to celebrate the opening of the season at Kempsey-Crescent Head SLSC. I have stated many times that attracting youth and patrolling members is vital to our future but challenging. I trust SLSNSW will take on this challenge in the coming season.

There were many milestones this season including the South West Rocks SLSC being named as the Macleay Valley Community Club of the year. The SLSMNC Branch was named as the SLSNSW Branch of the Year for 2021/22, along with several successful SLSNSW Awards of Excellence winners. A magnificent effort for a small Branch. Our records indicate that over the past 10 years we have had close to twenty state winners - a very high achievement for our Branch and its members.

Thank you to the entire Education Team, for their tireless efforts in ensuring that all Education aspects are current and kept as straightforward as possible for our members.

The Surf Sports program finally had a relatively incident free run this season, after a few years of cancellations. One pleasing aspect is the continuing development of the Interbranch Squad which will no doubt bring improved results into the future, and at the 2024 Interbranch Carnival. This season we implemented the Warriors on Water Carnival, held at South West Rocks which was well attended. Similarly, Carnivals at Tacking Point and Branch Championships at South West Rocks went well with some keen competition. The Country Championships were again held at Cape Hawke with terrific representation from MNC. Port Macquarie SLS should be congratulated on their 3rd place in the overall point score which is an outstanding effort.

Macksville-Scotts Head held a sweeps school and a round of the North Coast Boat Series, which provides opportunities to advance Surf Boat Rowing in our Branch. Another area of Surf Sports that I would encourage is IRB Racing. SWRSLSC has conducted the SLSNSW Championships and Premiership in the past two seasons. It would be great to have some MNC Clubs be able to fly the flag in the future.

I thank all the competitors, officials, coaches and age managers for their ongoing support and development of all things surf sports. Notwithstanding more Officials are always needed and Surf Sports is a key ingredient for the prosperity of Surf Life Saving. Big thanks to Sandra Slattery for coordinating everything which is a huge job.

The marketing and promotion of our Branch have been well delivered by Director of Marketing and Communications, Brienna Elford. This is a relatively new role that delves into all portfolios. From my observations, the media coverage, website quality and relationships with sponsors have been exemplary and the benefits of this work will enable us to maintain our presence as leaders in community interactions and safety for anyone in the aquatic environment.

Unfortunately, there have been a few local Government issues that have been unsettling this past season. The support from Local Government in some instances is underwhelming and a matter that needs to be addressed as a Statewide issue. Issues such as leasing, Clubhouse maintenance, lifeguards, funding and better relationships will be something that MNC will be focusing on coming into the next season.

INTERBRANCH

After the Interbranch carnival, I submitted a report to Branch on the performance of our Interbranch Squad.

DEVELOPMENT SQUAD

During the last few months, we have held a number of Development Squad sessions at various locations within the Branch from Hat Head, South West Rocks in the north to Bonny Hills, Lighthouse and Flynns Beaches in the south. These locations offered different conditions and allowed the coaches to actually coach and improve the skills of all athletes who confirmed their attendance from our original expression of interest.

I must indicate at this point we have informed all who have attended this program that it is not part of the selection process for the 2023/24 Interbranch Team, but it will assist in improving the surf skills exponentially.

From the last four sessions, we can see the improvement of all athletes who have attended regularly and we can also see a good positive and happy culture developing within the group.

With the cold weather approaching we have decided to give everyone a break over the July/August period, but at the same time, to ensure they have every possible opportunity to make this Team for next season, Adam Smith, Elaine Walker the assistant coaches, Mitchell Dawson, manager, and myself have formulated a training program for this period so if they follow this plan they will be ready to go from September when we really ramp up the training. They will have an 8-week program to follow, which will have them peaking at their best for the Branch Carnival Selection.

As part of this program, we have been invited to attend Kingscliff to train with their Squad under the guidance of Country Coach Scott McCartney. This will be the second week of the October school holidays and we have advised the parents if they are interested in this trip to seek accommodation now. I will send further details to them as the date approaches.


DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION REPORT

Surf Life Saving Mid North Coast

NEWCASTLE PERMANENT DEE WHY YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CAMP

On a Thursday morning in January a keen group of young lifesavers set out on the annual Youth Development Program to Dee Why. The participants came from six of our Clubs, ranged in age from 14 to 17 and held either their SRC, Bronze and IRB crew awards.

They were chaperoned by Nicole Chilcott, Ken Parish, Kirstie Swaine and myself. Port Bus supplied the minicoach and trailer, driven by Ron, a seasoned traveller who met all our needs and got us safely and on time to all the venues we visited.

In its eighth year, the program set out to showcase the participants' pathways and opportunities that are available to them. The awards they hold now and gain in the future through Surf Life Saving can be used to follow any of the pathways we attended.

The first day saw us travel to Northmead in Sydney's west. The CareFlight Rapid Response helicopter base was our lunch stop, followed by an opportunity to have Nat the Community Engagement Officer talk about the history and purpose of the service, moving on to the first aid kits, monitors and equipment used on the aircraft. There was demonstrations on tourniquets and Gary spoke of the awards required to perform his role as a Patient Transport Officer for CareFlight.

We arrived at our base, our home away from home for four days, that being Dee Why SLSC. The Coles home delivery arrived on time, an ocean swim happened and Kenny mustered up a few of the boys to assist in the BBQ. Lighting it was a challenge, and for the life of me, I still cannot understand why someone has to put their head underneath to see if it is lit. A little reeducation and dinner was cooked. No one was hurt.

Second day greeted us with an awesome sunrise, followed by early breakfast and off to the Randwick City Lifeguards office at Maroubra Beach. Peter and his team gave us a presentation on the role they play in the community, we viewed the live camera technology, their RWCs and equipment. We learned the challenging process to become a Lifeguard and the awards required.

Down the beach a couple of hundred well-planned metres we bumped into Duty Officer and crew member of SR30 Nixy Krite and Joel Wiseman SLSNSW Director of Lifesaving. Nixy showed us the Duty Officer vehicle and the equipment inside, the drones and RWC. Nixy and Joel spoke of the vast areas the teams cover, the complexity of patrolling the cliffs and rock ledges. Joel spoke of what it takes to become a Duty officer, an RWC and UAV operator. A quick photo opportunity on the Nutrigrain Ironman podium was not to be missed.

Next stop, just over the hill we arrived at The fallen Lifesaver Memorial at Coogee. We were greeted by Doug Hawkins and Tony Waller who spoke of the history and true meaning of the memorial. A bouquet was laid and a minutes silence was observed to reflect upon those who paid the ultimate sacrifice, those brave men who left our shores to fight for our country and who never returned. We learned of the women who stepped up to keep the Surf Clubs running during these times.

Returning back to Dee Why Surf Club for lunch and off again, next stop SLSNSW headquarters at Belrose. We were met by Jordan who took us up to Surfcom, the State Operations Centre where all Surf Lifesaving communications are centred and actioned. We witnessed live UAV video feeds from Brunswick Heads on the Far North Coast, live video feeds from Town and Shelly Beaches in Port Macquarie. From here we had a presentation on UAV services in Surf Life Saving, the present vacancies for operators and what the future looks like.

A group photo in patrol uniform and return to Dee Why. For the second day in a row, we had a welcoming swim and cool-off. Hot showers and ready for dinner. I would like to thank Kirstie for being Master Chef for this trip, the other chaperones who assisted greatly and the magical lineup of human dishwashers and dryers, floor sweepers and morning and afternoon tea pack packers. We couldn't have done it without you all.

On day three, light drizzle greeted us along with the bells of a group on the beach celebrating the sunrise. Patrol day is here. We got into our three patrol teams and headed off after breakfast to patrol at Dee Why, North Steyne and Manly.

Nicole's patrol had the furthest to go, arriving at Manly just in time to be greeted by a generous Club sponsor handing out fresh pastries from their French Patisserie down the road. They patrolled diligently, taking a roving stroll to Shelly Beach to burn off those nice treats. No rescues, first aids but preventative actions and an opportunity to see a round of the local surfboat series on their beach.

Kenny's patrol looked after the locals at Dee Why. Their area covered over to the rocks beyond the ocean baths, across the road to the ice cream shop and ping pong table in the park. A busy time on the beach, warm sunshine and clear water made for high attendances.

My patrol arrived early and met the Council Lifeguard in charge and our North Steyne volunteer patrol captain. We were helped by a couple of seasoned clubbies and the patrol was set up before the full patrol arrived. We checked the first aid equipment, performed preventative actions and found the Life Members cooking up a storm on the complimentary morning tea barbeque. All members were signed on in the patrol app, and their hours have been recorded. There was also an opportunity to flush an IRB motor after a capsize, with three of the boys getting it done in fifteen minutes. Good experience under the watchful eye of the club IRB trainer.

One o'clock and back to base for lunch and a change of clothes. It was time for everyone to enjoy the afternoon at Raging Waters. This was an opportunity to showcase pool lifeguarding, not just for a swim and relax (sorry I fibbed). Everyone deserved this. Pizza in the carpark as the sun went down and back to Dee Why for showers and sleep.

On our last morning at Dee Why, up for breakfast, pack up, sweep up and tidy the Clubhouse. This trip we left the best to last, with a visit to the Westpac Rescue Helicopter base at La Perouse. We were met by Crew member Tony Waller who took us into the operations room where we met the pilot and the crew. Talk on weather tracking, past missions, the role they play assisting our patrols on the ground and a overview of the equipment that is used on each flight. There was a winching scenario played out with both Sophie and Ewan and some survival tips. All finished with a speedy departure on a mission to the south for us to watch.

Our return to Port Macquarie was inevitable, after four days of visiting locations that few other youth Surf Lifesavers have the opportunity to see, let alone in such a short space of time, we arrived back home.

Full of knowledge, having gained a better understanding of the pathways within Surf Lifesaving and appreciative of the chaperones and bus driver that helped make this program all happen. Thank you to all the participants for the way in which you have displayed enthusiasm to listen, learn and participate. To all the parents out there of these youth, everyone now knows how to wash and wipe up in the kitchen.

REGISTRAR REPORT

A semblance of normality returned to surf lifesaving this year with a relaxation of Covid restrictions and far better weather and surf conditions up and down the Branch beaches. This allowed for increased Nipper activities and training courses which is reflected in the overall awards gained throughout the season. I would like to congratulate all those members who remained steadfast in their roles and achieved great results across the clubs to retain members and train them where and when required. In particular, those that took on additional oles as Nipper



Age Managers and carers. Having stated the above proficiencies were similar to last year with a total of 2338 junior and senior proficiencies gained. Just lower than last year's figures.

Not surprisingly there was an increased number (1000) of senior awards, senior proficiencies, JAC awards and proficiencies carried out or completed totalling 6300. There were 98 new Bronze Medallion awards in the season which is twice that completed last year. A great result for increasing members patrolling on the beach.

A really satisfying result is the number of senior awards completed such as the IRB Crew person award 28 up from 18, Silver Medallion IRB Drivers awards 16 up from 4 which are critical for the successful operation of patrols. This a really great result showing how hard IRB trainers worked throughout the year to increase member participation in gaining these awards.


During the season two hundred and seventy-one (271) transfers were completed by Branch clubs during the season. This was down slightly from last year. Of these, there were 134 transfers (70 male and 64 female) into the Branch and 137 out (75 male and 62 female). I would ask that each club refer to Surfquard and action any outstanding transfers that have carried over into the new year.

Retention rates of both active and junior members have been an ongoing issue for Surf Life Saving over the last two years and unfortunately, our Branch clubs have suffered this same fate. Having said that the efforts of clubs to retain and attract members should be congratulated as the Branch figures are quite good compared to some of the others. Junior memberships increased from 877 last year to 895 this year. Senior memberships of active members have increased and nearing our pre-Covid figures, with 613 members this year compared to 585 members last year.

There have been multiple upgrades to Surf Guard to enhance user experience this year and they will be rolled out from the start of the new season for all users. Congratulations to all those who made the season an extremely successful year and I am sure the upcoming season will only be more satisfying.



LIFESAVING

The SWRSLSC celebrated its 103rd season, making it the longest serving club within the MNC Branch, providing 2399.42 hours from 49 members (an average of 48.9 hours/member) for the season and attending six serious call outs.

Grahame Ball, Brienna Elford and Rod McDonagh were awarded the SLSNSW Rescue of the Month in October 2022. National Medals were awarded to Ian Everingham, Sid Jeffrey, Rebecca Mitchell, Andrew Packwood, Dave Pearson, Mark Notley, Paul Owens and Tony Silvia.

Members Bobbie Brenton, Erin Cook, Brienna Elford and Georgia Gaddes attended the SLSNSW Female ALBERT training weekend at Fingal Beach SLSC in May 2023. There were also youth members - Ollie Byrne, James Gaddes, Aden Mills and Imogen Ward who attended the SLSMNC Dee Why Development Camp and Georgia Gaddes who was selected as a Facilitator at the SLSNSW YOM camp in Sydney.

EDUCATION

Our education team held two BM/SRC courses provided 10 additional patrolling members and four of our current SRCs gained their BM. An IRB induction was conducted for 15 candidates from SWR and HH after their BM assessment. Three of our trainers have gained probationary assessor status and are eagerly awaiting to be signed off as endorsed assessors.

SURF SPORTS

We once again showed our ability to host surf sports carnivals, hosting the following carnivals during the 2022/23 season:

The reintroduction of Sunday Morning Point Score was a great success with both junior and senior members taking up the opportunity to gain some great experience. A free Friday morning swim squad was also introduced at the SWR pool for all active members and nippers.

SWRSLSC President, Rod McDonagh was awarded the International Lifesaving Diamond Award for Officiating at over 12 World Lifesaving Championships.

COMMUNITY

Community engagement was continually showcased throughout the 2022/23 season through many facets, including coordinating the Beachside Markets with the SWR Chamber of Commerce, providing water safety for the Trial Bay Triathlon, assisting with the SWR Runfest, providing cruise ship navigational support, providing First Aid at the Macleay Valley Muster, providing local returned service personnel to engage in fitness classes through the SWR RSL Sub-branch, laid a wreath at the ANZAC Day Dawn Service, 24 Hour Row for Mental Health, hosted the Queenscliff Nippers Camp and 'Macleay Nippers'.

A Reconciliation Action Plan was developed (the first SLSC in NSW to do so) in consultation with the local Aboriginal Community. This coincided with the inaugural Nippers Cultural Day held on Main Beach where our members were given the opportunity to learn about the local Dunghutti culture from the South West Rocks Figtree Mob.

The Club was also awarded some prestigious community awards throughout the season - Kempsey Shire Council Australia Day Award 'Community Group of the Year' for 2023 and our Director of Lifesaving, Brienna Elford was awarded the Kempsey Shire Council Australia Day Award for Citizen of the Year for 2023.

ADMINISTRATION

The SWRSLSC Rules and Bylaws document was approved at the 2022 AGM and will work alongside the Club's Constitution.

The Club engaged with the SLS Foundation to access the Lottery program that is in place.

A weekly newsletter was implemented and sent to all active and social members to keep them informed of all goings on around the clubhouse.

The 2022/2023 season kicked off on a positive foot this year without the burden of Covid hanging over us as it had the previous season. Thank you to all the members who come back each year to give their time to provide this vital service to the community.

PATROLS

SLSNSW extended our Service Level Agreement this year with an additional burden on all members. As one of eight clubs in the Mid North Coast Branch and one of the most attended beaches, we were required to patrol more hours than any other club in the Branch.

Congratulations to all patrolling members who assisted with patrols. We achieved zero preventable drownings on our beach during patrols and with over 31,000 visitors. This season with approx. 120 active patrolling members plus Active Reserves, provided sufficient coverage of Flynns Beach throughout the season. Whilst good numbers were available for patrols, IRB Drivers & Crew shortages continued to be an issue especially when subs were required.

RESCUES

Whilst it's pleasing to report that no fatalities occurred during the season, on a number of occasions this was only due to the vigilance and quick response of our patrolling members. Patrolling members carried out over 4,800 hours on the beach, reported 1,567 preventative actions, and carried out 12 successful rescues.

<u>AWARDS</u>

The club ran several courses throughout the season including SRC & Bronze Medallion which bolstered patrol numbers upon completion. National Service medals were achieved by Trevor Franklin, Tony Wright, Rob McCue and Jennifer Wookey.

NIPPERS

The season saw a very strong contingent of nippers attend the beach with a high percentage entering

competition. The junior club enjoyed a very successful season not only taking out the branch title but also greatly contributed to the club's overall 3rd place at the country titles. The financial report is for Surf Life Saving Mid North Coast Branch Inc. as an individual entity. Surf Life Saving Mid North Coast Branch Inc. is a not-for-profit Association, registered and domiciled in Australia.

The financial report was authorised for issue by the Members of the Committee on 01 July 2023.

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

The Committee has prepared the financial statements on the basis that Surf Life Saving Mid North Coast Branch Inc. is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. The financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Association's constitution, its funding agreement, and the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*, and to meet the needs of members.

The financial statements are have been prepared in accordance with the significant accounting policies disclosed below, which the Committee has determined are appropriate to meet the needs of members. Such accounting policies are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs unless otherwise stated in the notes. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

(a) Income tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*. The exempt status of the Association applies indefinitely or until such time as a change in circumstances warrants a review of the exempt status.

(b) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses.

Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the assets useful life to the Association, commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Depreciation is recognised in profit or loss.

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise.

(c) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other financial institutions and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(d) Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables include amounts due from customers for services rendered by the Association. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current.

(e) Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are carried at amortised cost and represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the Association during the reporting period that remain unpaid at the end of the reporting period. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability. Trade and other payables are initially measured at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

(f) Revenue recognition

Grants from State and Commonwealth Governments and other funding bodies are recognised in the statement of profit or loss when the Association obtains control over the grant and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the Association and the amount of the grant can be measured reliably. Control over grant funds is normally obtained upon the receipt of cash.

Revenue is recognised when control of the goods and services has transferred to the customers. For such transactions, this is the point in time when the goods are delivered to the customers or the services are received by customers.

Interest revenue is recognised when received.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(g) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenue, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO).

Receivables and payable are stated inclusive of GST.

Cash flows in the statement of cash flows are included on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

(h) Comparative figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.
